

New Book Presents a Wide-Ranging Discussion of Technology and the Future of Public and Academic Libraries

Twenty library leaders, bloggers, and futurists share observations, opinions, predictions, and advice for the profession

October 29, 2007, Monterey, California—At the Internet Librarian conference taking place at the Monterey Conference Center this week, Information Today, Inc. (ITI) announced the publication of Information Tomorrow: Reflections on Technology and the Future of Public and Academic Libraries, edited by Rachel Singer Gordon.

Information Tomorrow presents contributions from 20 of today's leading thinkers on the intersections between libraries and technology. They address various ways in which new technologies are impacting library services and offer ideas for using technology to meet patrons where they are.
