

The Embedded Librarian

New book makes a compelling argument for a model of librarianship based on partnerships, collaboration, and mutual accountability between librarians and information users.



July 16, 2012, Chicago, IL—At the Annual Special Libraries Association Conference and Exhibition, Information Today, Inc. [ITI] announced the publication of *The Embedded Librarian: Innovative Strategies for Taking Knowledge Where It's Needed* by David Shumaker.

Here is the first comprehensive survey of the growing practice of "embedded librarianship"—a strategic model for placing information professionals into partnerships with the individuals and working groups that depend upon their knowledge and expertise. In *The Embedded Librarian*, David Shumaker looks at implementations in all types of organizations, identifies the characteristics of successful embedded librarians, and explains how information professionals in public, academic, school, medical, law, and other specialized library settings are using embedded librarianship principles to enhance their work and careers.

"We librarians must master new technologies for managing and delivering information. We must engage with knowledge and recognize the difference between information and knowledge. We must develop new organizational structures and new management techniques," says Shumaker in the book's Introduction. "Above all, we must establish new relationships with *information users*—the people in our communities, universities, schools, corporations, agencies, and firms who need us. These imperatives are operating in every sector of the profession."

As the way librarians access information changes with the improvements in technology, they must take on new roles in order to add value of their organizations. The approach in which librarians partner with information users, participate in information communities, develop relationships with teams, contribute directly to enhanced team and organizational performance. Shumaker been a successful manager of embedded library operations, and has been engaged in studying and researching the topic for over five years. He makes a compelling argument as to why librarians should embrace this approach as a way to provide value to the organization and their customers.

In *The Embedded Librarian*, David also presents a series of exercises from workshops that he has led that are intended to provide the tools librarians need in order to implement change in their own organization. He includes self-assessment questions, a step-by-step guide, and methods of evaluation to help the novice embedded librarian in his/her work.
